Measure P School Improvements in Progress

Update on MEASURE

The GGUSD community overwhelmingly approved Measure P during the November 2016 election. The \$311 million bond measure received an impressive 76.3 percent approval from voters who share the district's commitment to improving GGUSD schools. The district is grateful for the significant community support for Measure P which will fund important seismic, safety, air conditioning, and modernization projects. The bond will be issued over the course of several years and only a portion of the \$311 million will be available right away. Here is a look ahead at the work slated for 2017:

- Measure P will fund air conditioning in all 25 of the district's non-airconditioned schools over the next five years. The first phase of work will begin in Spring 2017 and will bring new air conditioning to five elementary schools for the start of the 2017-2018 school year.
- Work on the new Michael Monsoor Stadium at Garden Grove High School is underway and scheduled for completion in August of 2017. The stadium at Bolsa Grande High School will receive the same state-of-the-art renovations and the athletic facilities at GGUSD high schools will receive important upgrades.
- Earthquake safety improvements, including roof replacements, updated building electrical systems, and new science and technology classrooms are also among the Measure P projects.

Thousands of GGUSD students participate in national *Hour of Code*[™] initiative.

GGUSD has a dedicated career pathway for Information and Communication Technology and Computer Science.





Thousands of students of all ages at more than 20 GGUSD schools gained a whole host of computer science skills by participating in *The Hour of Code*^M. Elementary students used code to program the animation of their favorite Star Wars characters and high school students practiced more advanced coding used to build mobile phone applications. Across the district, students enthusiastically embraced the *The Hour of Code*^M which gave them practice using the types of technology skills used in 21st century careers.

In California, computer science is not a required course and nine out of ten high schools do not offer computer science. However, GGUSD offers more than 15 computer science classes as well as a dedicated career pathway for Information and Communication Technology and Computer Science.
