GGUSD's Commitment to Innovation Leads to Student Success

Innovation: those who truly use their time and talent to innovate are changing the world. Our students today are the innovators of tomorrow. Throughout the 2017-2018 school year, our staff have embraced innovative strategies at every turn. We are constantly searching out cutting-edge tools that will transform our students'

learning experience and provide them with greater tools to innovate. Here are just a few examples:

- Dual Language Academies: GGUSD is launching its second Spanish Dual Language Academy at Russell Elementary School to meet a growing demand to provide students with a pathway to learn, read and write in both English and Spanish. Students enrolled in the program will also have opportunities to earn the Pathway to Biliteracy Award, which is provided by the Orange County Department of Education. This is an important tool for young people to succeed in a global society. Already, GGUSD's Spanish Dual Language Academy at Monroe Elementary and the Vietnamese Dual Language program at Murdy Elementary have demonstrated tremendous success.
- Computer Science Immersion: We partnered with Code to the Future, the nation's premier creator of computer science immersion schools, to launch the district's first Computer Science Immersion Academy at Heritage Elementary School beginning in 2018-2019. Students will learn robotics, coding, and other computer programming skills as part of their daily instruction.
- **STEAM Labs:** Many GGUSD schools have opened STEAM Labs to empower students to explore science, technology, engineering, art, and math in new and exciting ways.
- **Coding and Robotics:** Students across the district are participating in after-school clubs to learn about and compete in coding, robotics, and rocketry.
- College and Career Readiness: Three GGUSD schools Alamitos Intermediate, Doig Intermediate and Santiago High School, were among only five schools in Orange County to receive the AVID Schoolwide Site of Distinction Award. This means, they are using the highest level of AVID's newest college and career readiness instructional strategies in every classroom.

- Advanced Placement Capstone: GGUSD offers the College Board's Advanced Placement Capstone Program at two high schools, providing a greater level of rigor and challenging students toward higher thinking and innovation. Only 1,000 schools worldwide are selected to offer this program.
- Culture of Kindness: Students are developing new ways to show compassion and kindness to their classmates, including a Share Table that uses allows students to donate their unwanted lunch items to a Share Table for those in need.


Our model practices and innovative ideas have led GGUSD to be named a 2018 California Exemplary District by the California Department of Education. The new award celebrates districts that have implemented model practices, which resulted in positive student outcomes. Additionally, eleven elementary schools in GGUSD were named 2018 California Distinguished Schools, a top honor for the state's most inspiring public schools that demonstrate significant academic gains in narrowing the achievement gap. GGUSD has more schools on the 2018 California Distinguished Schools list than any district in Orange County and any comparable district across the state.

A lo largo del año escolar 2017-2018, nuestro personal ha adoptado estrategias innovadoras a cada paso. Aquí hay solo algunos ejemplos:



• Academia de Inmersión en Ciencias de la Computación: Nos hemos asociado con Code to the Future, la creadora líder de las escuelas de inmersión en las ciencias de la computación en el país, para abrir en nuestro Distrito la primera Academia de Inmersión en las Ciencias de la Computación en la Escuela Primaria Heritage a principios del año escolar 2018-2019. Los estudiantes aprenderán como parte de su instrucción diaria robótica, codificación, y otras destrezas de programación de computadoras.

- Laboratorios STEAM: Muchas escuelas del GGUSD han inaugurado laboratorios STEAM para alentar a los estudiantes a explorar las Ciencias, la Tecnología, la Ingeniería, el Arte y las Matemáticas de maneras nuevas y emocionantes.
- Codificación y robótica: Los estudiantes de todo el Distrito están participando en clubs extracurriculares para aprender y competir en codificación, robótica y cohetería.
- Preparación universitaria y para carreras profesionales: Tres escuelas del GGUSD – las Escuelas Intermedias Alamitos y Doig y la Escuela Secundaria Santiago, estuvieron entre las únicas cinco escuelas en el Condado de Orange en recibir el premio de Distinción

Sau đây là môt vài ví du:

• Các Chương Trình Song Ngữ: GGUSD đang mở Chương Trình Song Ngữ Tây Ban Nha thứ hai tại Trường Tiểu Học Russell nhằm đáp ứng nhu cầu đang gia tăng giúp con em học sinh trên bước đường học tập để có thể đọc và viết thông thạo Anh ngữ lẫn Tây Ban Nha. Học sinh ghi danh học chương trình này cũng sẽ có cơ hội nhận Bằng Khen Song Ngữ do Sở Giáo Dục Hạt Orange cấp. Đây là hành trang quan trọng giúp giới trẻ thành công

trong xã hội toàn cầu. Trước đó, GGUSD cũng rất thành công với Chương Trình Song Ngữ Tây Ban Nha tại Trường Tiểu Học Monroe và Chương Trình Song Ngữ Tiếng Việt tại Trường Tiểu Học Murdy.

- Chương Trình Khoa Học Điện Toán Hội Nhập: Chúng tôi đã hợp tác với cơ quan 'Code to the Future', tổ chức đầu tiên thành lập các trường khoa học điện toán hội nhập trên toàn quốc để thực hiện Chương Trình Khoa Học Điện Toán Hội Nhập đầu tiên tại Trường Tiểu Học Heritage bắt đầu vào niên học 2018-2019. Học sinh sẽ học về máy tự động, mã hoá và kỹ năng lập trình trong chương trình học hằng ngày.
- Phòng Thí Nghiệm STEAM: Nhiều trường trong GGUSD đã mở phòng Thí Nghiệm STEAM (Khoa Học, Kỹ Thuật, Kỹ Thuật Công Trình, Nghệ Thuật Và Toán) để học sinh có thể học hỏi và khám phá những điều lý thú mới.
- Chương Trình Mã Hoá và Khoa Tự Động Học: Học sinh trong toàn học khu đang tham gia các chương trình tranh đua và học hỏi về mã hoá, tự động học và kỹ t huât hoả tiễn.



Stroke Can Occur at Any Age

Most people picture an adult when thinking about stroke. Sadly, this is not always the case. Strokes remain one of the top 10 causes of death in children. According to the National Stroke Association, stroke occurs in one in 4,000 live births. The risk of stroke from birth to age 18 is almost 11 in 100,000; though slightly more common in children under 2.

Risk Factors

Adult risk factors for stroke include high blood pressure, irregular heartbeat and/or a hardening of the arteries. Pediatric stroke risks are different, and include:

- Congenital heart defects Sickle-cell disease
- Abnormal blood clotting Head or neck trauma
- Maternal history of infertility
- Maternal infection in the fluid surrounding an unborn baby
- Pregnancy-related high blood pressure in the mother



Signs & Symptoms


Recognition of stroke is often delayed or missed in children. The most common signs and symptoms of stroke in newborns and infants are:

- Seizures, including repetitive twitching of the face, arm or leg
- Apnea (pauses in breathing) associated with staring
- Extreme sleepiness
- A tendency to use only one side of their body

With children and teens, look for:

- Weakness or numbness of the face, arm or leg, usually on one side of the body
- Severe dizziness or loss of coordination
- Severe sudden headache, especially with vomiting and sleepiness
- Difficulty speaking or understanding others
- Vision loss or double vision
- New onset of seizures, usually on one side of the body

Don't Play With Toy Safety

According to the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), there were an estimated 166,300 toy related injuries treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments, and seven reported fatalities of children 12 years of age or younger during 2016. Register your toys to stay up to date with any recalls.

The Injury Prevention Program at Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach wants to keep kids safe in the community by providing safety education to children and families. For more information on childhood safety education and resources, visit millerchildrens.org/injuryprevention.

Many toy related injuries and fatalities can be prevented by taking some precautionary steps when buying new toys for your child:

- Purchase age appropriate toys recommended by the manufacturer.
- Read and follow all warning labels, especially for electric toys.
- Avoid toys with small parts that may become a choking hazard for younger children.
- Be cautious of toys with small batteries and magnets because they can cause serious harm if swallowed.
- Be aware of toys that may contain lead.
- Ensure that toys with movable parts do not trap or jam your child's finger.
- Be sure your child can breathe comfortably in toys they can enter, such as a tent.
