Agenda Item 5 – A: Memorandum of Understanding Between the Garden Grove Unified School District and the Regents of the University of California, on Behalf of the Center for Educational Partnerships at the University of California, Irvine – Program Evaluation Assistance

The Irvine Mathematics Project Professional Development Program is partnering with the Garden Grove Unified School District to design hands-on, research-based professional development, standards-based curriculum guides, and unit plans aligned to the California State Standards for K-12 mathematics teachers. Conducting ongoing, data-driven program evaluation is essential for fulfilling this commitment. The Garden Grove Unified School District and the Regents of the University of California, on behalf of the Center for Educational Partnerships at the University of California, Irvine (UCI), will share student-level data without identifiers for purposes of research and program evaluation directly related to the improvement of instruction in the district. Evaluation will help assess program effects as well as serve as a guide for improving program models. The Research and Evaluation Unit at the Center for Educational Partnerships at UCI will gain and adhere to all needed district approvals prior to gathering or receiving data.

Agenda Item 5 – B: Agreement with Coast Community College District and Rancho Santiago Community College District for Adult Education Block Grant Funds

Assembly Bill 104 (AB 104) gives the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges and the Superintendent of Public Instruction the authority to administer the Adult Education Block Grant to identify and understand the educational needs of adults and to support the effective provision of services to address those needs. The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office has provided funds to Coast Community College District and Rancho Santiago Community College District as the member approved fiscal agents for Coast Adult Education Consortium and Rancho Santiago Education Consortium. The Garden Grove Unified School District, as a voting and collaborative member of these consortiums, has worked with both to develop a one-year plan that outlines specific performance goals, personnel, and services, allocating funds for each member. A total of \$189,800 will be reimbursed to the Garden Grove Unified School District from Coast Consortium for Adult Education services and a total of \$199,727 will be reimbursed from Rancho Santiago Education Consortium. Authorization to expend the funds and invoice Coast Community College District and Rancho Santiago Community College District for reimbursement is requested.

The national Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) authorized statewide and local workforce investment opportunities and programs to increase employment, retention, and earnings of adults. On October 10, 2010, the Board of Education established the Measure A Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (BOC). The BOC is charged with verifying the lawful expenditure of bond funds authorized by Measure A approved by voters in June 2010. The BOC is comprised of members representing parents, businesses, senior citizens, school-parent organizations, and several at-large representatives. The committee is required to submit an annual written report to the Board, in public session, with a statement whether the district is in compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, and a summary of the committee's proceedings and activities for the preceding year. The Annual Report reflects activity for the fiscal period of July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015.

The BOC advises the public that the district is in compliance with Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution. Bond proceeds have been expended on projects set forth in the ballot measure. No proceeds have been used for teacher or administrative salaries or other school operating expenditures. Audits have been performed as prescribed by law.

Agenda Item 6 – C: Selection of Auditor for 2015-16 Financial Compliance Audits

Education Code 41020 requires that, by April 1, the governing board of each school district shall provide for annual audit of all funds, books, records, accounts, and financial statements and for a compliance audit of federally assisted programs.

The firm Christy White Accountancy Corporation (CWAC) has performed the financial audit since 2009-10. A new three-year agreement with the district is required and CWAC is proposing to perform the 2015-16 financial audit of all funds and review of federal and state programs as year one of the contract at a fee of \$72,065.

The auditor will perform procedures necessary to render an opinion as to whether or not the district's financial statements are free from material misstatement, management has complied with laws and regulations, and a system of internal controls has been established and maintained.

The fee covers the compliance areas required in the state controller's audit guides for state programs, federal audit standards included in the Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, and applicable Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statements requirements.
