Agenda Item 6 – A: Resolution No. 27 – Dedication of an Easement at the Bolsa Grande High School Site to Southern California Edison

In order to provide new electrical service to the Bolsa Grande High School site, Southern California Edison is requiring an easement to install and maintain/operate the transformer. School districts must follow a specific statutory process for dedicating a utility easement that involves: 1) the Board approving a resolution of intent to dedicate the utility easement at one meeting; 2) staff giving public notice for a hearing to be held at a second meeting; and 3) holding a public hearing at the second meeting and then approving a second resolution dedicating the easement, which must be adopted by a two-thirds vote of the Board.

On April 4, 2017, the Board approved Resolution No. 26 declaring its intent to dedicate an easement. On April 7, 2017, a notice was published in a newspaper of general circulation and the same notice, along with Resolution No. 26, was posted at three district sites. On April 18, 2017, the governing board conducted a public hearing.

Agenda Item 6 – C: Extend Bid No. 1503 – Office, Paper, and Instructional Supplies for Warehouse Stock and District Use

On April 5, 2016, the Board accepted bids for office, paper, and instructional supplies for warehouse stock and district use. The bid included provisions to extend the contract two additional years, one year at a time. Contracts were awarded to four vendors. All four vendors opted to extend the contract: National Art and School Supply with no increase; Southwest School and Office with an average cost increase of 1.5 percent on 63 out of 188 items; SupplyMaster, with no increase to item numbers 38 and 239, is unable to offer item number 259 and therefore, item number 259 will be awarded to Southwest School and Office as the next lowest bidder; and Veritiv with no increase. The bid included a percentage off catalog clause to the awarded bidders. The term of the contract is from April 6, 2017, through April 5, 2018.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Second Harvest Food Bank of Orange County and the Garden Grove Unified School District has been established to provide access to our students and their families to the after school mobile School Pantry Program. The mission of the program is to help alleviate child hunger in America by providing food to children and their families. The program resembles a farmers market with volunteers specifically trained to operate in an efficient and welcoming manner. The program will allow for distribution at participating schools once a month with the majority of the food distributed being fresh produce as well as other nutritious items available at the time of distribution. In addition to distributing food, another program goal is to partner with other community resources such as Healthy Smiles, to provide nutrition education, recipe/food demonstrations, and information on important resources. This is the first time the district will participate in this program and it is at no cost to the district.
