Requests for bids were sent to vendors for the transportation of the district's special education students. Bids were evaluated based on cost per bus per day, cost of extra hours, price structure, and pricing methodology for projected annual cost of service. The bid instructions and conditions contain provisions for awarding and renewing the contract in accordance with Education Code Sections 39802 and 39803.

The district received one bid packet submitted by Durham School Services. The bid offers a one-year term option with four one-year options to extend. The projected annual cost of transporting special education students is approximately \$4.1 million based on current services. Funds are budgeted in the General Fund. The bid is on file in the Purchasing Department.

The district entered into an agreement with the Orange County Teachers Federal Credit Union (now known as SchoolsFirst Federal Credit Union - SFFCU) in 2001 for the provision of automated teller machine (ATM) services.
