#### 4. ADMINISTRATION

Agenda Item 4 - A: Agreement for Resilient Mindful Learner Project

The Garden Grove Unified School District, Office of Special Education and the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, are establishing an agreement to provide training and learning support services as part of the Resilient Mindful Learner Project. This project will be at no cost to the district as it is funded by the Now Is the Time initiative and the California Wellness Grant. This project is in alignment with the district Strategic Plan, Goal 2 related to the socio-emotional well-being and mental health wellness for students and staff.

The Resilient Mindful Learner Project is administered by the Orange County Department of Education as a universal prevention strategy to reduce stress for classroom teachers and teach students resiliency skills. This training opportunity will involve up to forty classroom teachers who will participate in seven afterschool training sessions designed to support educators and their students in managing stress. Over the course of the first four weeks, teachers will learn strategies to recognize and manage their own personal stress. Over the balance of the next eight weeks, teachers will learn classroom strategies to support students' ability to recognize stress and mitigate the signs and symptoms through self-monitoring and self-regulation. Teachers will conduct classroom observations to support one another and then meet to reflect on the experience. All participants will also attend an all-day retreat to deepen their understanding of the benefits of mindfulness practice and extend their learning. As a result, teachers will better understand the benefits of professional stress management and help teach students how to integrate self-regulation skills into their learning routines. Teachers will receive a stipend of \$1100 dollars for their participation in the project.

The Agreement will begin on July 1, 2017, and end on January 30, 2018. The district agrees to pay a total sum not to exceed \$17,806, which will be funded through the mental health grant.

Agenda Item 4 - B: Agreement for Provision of Educationally-Related Mental Health Services Between the Orange County Mental

Health Care Agency and the Garden Grove Unified School District

An annual agreement for the provision of educationally-related mental health services between the Orange County Health Care Agency (HCA) and the Garden Grove Unified School District has been established for individual special education students who require residential placement services as determined by their Individualized Education Program (IEP). The agreement is effective July 1, 2107, through June 30, 2018. The HCA and the district initially established an agreement in July 2012 and have renewed annually since that time.

The county will make recommendations in an advisory capacity in helping the district find placement and services for students appearing to need residential placement. If a student is placed, the county will be reimbursed \$5.69 per minute for time spent on case management, including a pro-rated share of travel cost for out-of-state placement.

Agenda Item 5 – B: Big Brothers Big Sisters of Orange County Contract for After School and Partnership Program 2017-18

The City of Stanton received a Gang Reduction Intervention Partnership (GRIP) grant which provides services to students residing in Garden Grove and Stanton at various elementary and intermediate schools. As part of the GRIP program, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Orange County was contracted by GRIP to support two district elementary schools: Lawrence and Wakeham. Garden Grove, Pacifica, and Rancho Alamitos high school students were identified to participate as Big Brothers Big Sisters as part of the GRIP programs at Lawrence and Wakeham. The Garden Grove Unified School District has participated in the After School and Partnership Program since 2014. The high school students participate outside of their school day as a volunteer opportunity. Because GRIP has established this partnership with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Orange County, Garden Grove Unified School District is a participating formal agency.

A Big Brothers Big Sisters professional program specialist will supervise students in the GRIP program. The goal is to pair a maximum of 40 at-risk students from the elementary schools with 40 positive, caring, screened, and trained high school mentors, in a one-on-one mentoring relationship that provides positive modeling that leads to school success. High school students will provide academic assistance, foster self-esteem, and facilitate educational activities.

Agenda Item 6 – A: Resolution No. 28 – Intent to Dedicate an Easement at the Santiago High School Site to the Southern California **Edison Company** 

In order to provide new electrical service to Santiago High School, Southern California Edison is requiring an easement to install and maintain/operate the transformer.

School districts must follow specific statutory process for conveying a utility easement that involves: 1) the Board approving a resolution of intent to convey the utility easement at one meeting; 2) staff giving public notice for a hearing to be held at a second meeting; and 3) holding a public hearing at the second meeting and then approving a second resolution dedicating the easement.

The governing board must in a regular open meeting by a two-thirds vote of all its members, adopt and sign a resolution declaring its intention to convey the easement.

Agenda Item 6 – B: Termination of Bolsa Grande High School Building "R" Rehabilitation Lease/Leaseback Contract

On December 7, 2014, a fire destroyed eight classrooms of Building "R" at Bolsa Grande High School. On December 16, 2014, the Board approved emergency clean up and repairs that needed immediate attention for safety reasons. Due to the timeline of the investigation and prosecution of a criminal matter related to this fire, it took a prolonged amount of time to obtain approval from our insurance company to authorize extensive building repairs.

The Garden Grove Unified School District on November 15, 2016, entered into Lease/Leaseback contract documents with Paul C. Miller Construction Co., Inc. ("Paul C. Miller") for the Bolsa Grande High School Building "R" Rehabilitation according to the Division of the State Architect approved plans and specifications number 04-115463 ("Bolsa Grande Lease/Leaseback Contract"). During the plan review process, the Division of the State Architect required seismic upgrades to the building in order to approve the fire damage repairs. Unforeseen complications during soil preparation to increase ground stability made the building repair more costly than constructing a new building. Staff has been working closely with our insurance company to approve replacing the building instead of the original plan to repair it. Due to this change in plans, the existing Lease/Leaseback contract is proposed to be terminated with a new contract to be issued in the near future. Section six of the master facilities lease of the Bolsa Grande Lease/Leaseback contract provides that the district, in its sole discretion, may terminate the facilities lease upon three days written notice to Paul C. Miller. Paul C. Miller agrees to this termination and shall immediately comply with all applicable provisions in the Lease/Leaseback contract documents related to clean up, demobilization, and termination.

It is recommended that the Board approve the termination of the Bolsa Grande Lease/Leaseback contract, and direct the Superintendent or designee to: 1) terminate both the site lease and facilities lease of the Bolsa Grande Lease/Leaseback contract pursuant to the terms in the Lease/Leaseback contract documents available in the Business Office; and 2) take all steps and perform all actions necessary to terminate the Bolsa Grande Lease/Leaseback contract and to take any actions deemed necessary to best protect the interests of the district.

Agenda Item 6 – F: Authorization to Renew Contract for Mandated Cost Claims Services

Education Code 42243.6 allows school districts to file reimbursement claims with the State Controller's Office (SCO) for costs incurred in meeting state mandates. School Innovations & Achievement (SIA) has prepared and filed the district's mandated cost claims since October 1995, and continues to perform satisfactorily. The services include data collection, identification of reimbursable expenses, training of staff, and representation of claims with the SCO or the Commission of State Mandates during the audit process.

School Innovations & Achievement will prepare and file state approved mandates, which include current year reimbursement claims, next year's estimated claims, and new claims for claimable programs authorized by the SCO. The annual contract price is \$49,200 for the next year, with the ability to opt-out, with notice, at the end of the year of the agreement. The agreement period begins July 1, 2017, and expires on June 30, 2020.

The state has required school districts to provide mandated services, but has not provided funding to reimburse local costs since 2006-07. It is advisable to continue the filing of claims as the state is obligated to pay. Once the state allocates adequate funds, the professional service fees are fully claimable and reimbursable.

It is recommended that the Board authorize the renewal of the contract with School Innovations & Achievement to provide services that include the preparation, filing, and monitoring of mandated cost claims for the agreement period of July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2020.

#### 6. BUSINESS

Agenda Item 6 – I: 2017-18 Food Service Prices and Elimination of Reduced Price Co-Pay

Section 205 of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 (HHFKA) requires school districts participating in the National School Lunch Program to gradually increase the price charged for paid school lunch. The weighted average price charged to full-price students should eventually match the federal subsidy for free meals, currently at \$2.04 for breakfast and \$3.13 for lunch.

Due to the changes in regulations with HHFKA, and to be in compliance with federal regulations, some meal price increases on the attached list are being proposed. The last meal price increase was in the 2008-09 school year.

It is also recommended that the reduced price co-pay, which is \$0.30 for breakfast and \$0.40 for lunch, be eliminated. This would be beneficial for our students and families enabling more of our students to eat at no charge. Elimination of the reduced price co-pay has been implemented in other school districts, and statistics have shown that it increases student participation which more than makes up for the lost co-pay revenue.

The proposed food service prices and elimination of the reduced price co-pay will continue to support our operations. The district will continue to offer the lowest meal pricing amongst Orange County school districts while remaining 100 percent self-funded with no impact on the district's general fund.

It is recommended that the Board approve the 2017-18 food service prices and elimination of reduced price co-pay.

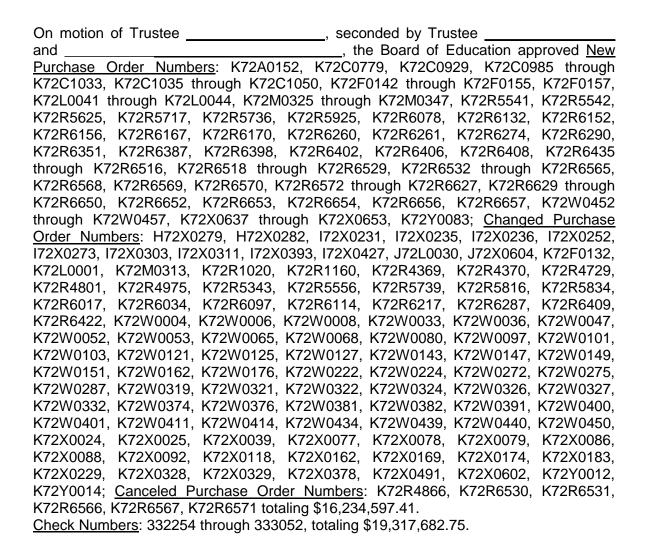

#### 7. PERSONNEL

Agenda Item 7 – D: Provisions for Classified and Certificated Retroactive Pay/Benefits

The Education Code provides that retroactive salary and benefit payments may not be made unless the Board of Education reserves the right, prior to June 30 of the preceding year, to adopt such changed salaries and benefits during the following year.

It is recommended that the Board reserve the right to make retroactive salary and benefit changes (including appropriate reimbursements) for all employees, whether covered by negotiated agreements or not, pending the completion of negotiations and current studies of salary and the outcome of finance legislation.

All previously adopted salaries will remain in effect until/unless changed by the Board of Education, or through negotiated agreements. These changes would become effective on dates ordered by the Board.

Agenda Item 7 – E: Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators

The Commission on Teacher Credentialing has adopted Title 5 procedures that govern district requests for issuing and renewing emergency credentials. Education Code Section 80026 now requires that the Board adopt a Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators no later than July 1 of each year. This declaration is valid for 12 months and is an estimate of the number of teachers with emergency credentials that may be needed during the 2017-18 school year. The estimate on the accompanying declaration is based on the number of emergency credentials requested by the district during the past several years. Many of the requests are for teachers being used as substitutes.

It is recommended that the Board adopt the Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators for the 2017-18 school year.
