Agenda Item 5 – A: Advancement Via Individual Determination Implementation Agreement 2016-17

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), is a secondary college readiness system that targets students who may be the first in their families to attend college of whom many are from low-income or minority families. The AVID program places students in rigorous courses and puts them on the college track.

Garden Grove Unified School District has worked collaboratively with the AVID Center since 2003. The AVID Center would like to continue to provide support to the district. Program support includes access to training for the AVID site team(s) and AVID elective teacher(s) through AVID Summer Institute, and AVID District Leadership training and access to other quality continuing professional development trainings or services such as AVID Path Trainings, AVID Weekly, AVID Test Prep and others. The AVID Center will aide in the analysis of data for our AVID school sites and review the quality of the implementation through the certification process. The cost of this support for our seventeen secondary sites is \$61,885.

It is recommended that the Board grant permission to accept the AVID Implementation Agreement from AVID Center for continued development and refinement of AVID standards, performance objectives, and 7-12 articulation process for the 2016-17 school year.

Agenda Item 5 – B: Big Brothers Big Sisters of Orange County Contract for After School and Partnership Program

The City of Stanton received a Gang Reduction Intervention Partnership (GRIP) grant which provides services to students residing in Garden Grove and Stanton at various elementary and intermediate schools. As part of the GRIP program, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Orange County was contracted by GRIP to support two district elementary schools: Lawrence and Wakeham. Rancho Alamitos, Garden Grove, and Pacifica high school students were identified to participate as big brothers and big sisters as a part of the GRIP programs at Lawrence and Wakeham. The high school students participate outside of their school day as a volunteer opportunity.

A Big Brothers Big Sisters professional program specialist will supervise students in the GRIP program. The goal is to pair a maximum of 40 at-risk students from the elementary schools with 40 positive and caring, screened and trained high school mentors, in a one-on-one mentoring relationship that provides positive modeling that leads to school success. High school students will provide academic assistance, foster self-esteem, and facilitate educational activities. The Garden Grove Unified School District has been participating in the After School and Partnership Program since 2014.

It is recommended that the Board approve a request for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Orange County and Garden Grove Unified School District to enter into a partnership to operate after school one-on-one mentoring at Lawrence and Wakeham elementary schools as a part of the GRIP program.

The Orange County United Way (OCUW) has presented the Garden Grove Unified School District with \$25,000 to support the Latinos Unidos project for the 2016-17 school year. Latinos Unidos is a district wide organization whose purpose is to provide support systems to Latino students in order to achieve academic success. Active Latinos Unidos clubs exist at all district high schools. The district has participated in this invited partnership since 2013.

Program goals will be accomplished through the following five key activities: 1) tutoring and academic support; 2) mentorship; 3) community service; 4) college preparation; and 5) social/cultural events. Funding will support all club activities and programs, including costs related to materials and supplies, printing, transportation, conference fees, and teacher hourly. Two major events sponsored by this funding are the Annual Latinos Unidos Conference for student leaders and the Latino Cultural Night organized for students, parents, and the community.

Destination Graduation is the Orange County United Way (OCUW) education initiative designed to ensure all students transition to and graduate from high school, college and career ready. The OCUW is partnering with Doig and Fitz intermediate schools and Los Amigos and Santiago high schools, to support the academic enhancement efforts of the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program and provide AVID students with additional college and career exposure opportunities aiding in their development of critical 21<sup>st</sup> century skills. The one-year grant would provide the district with \$66,500 to support teacher training, tutoring, materials, field trips, and district-level mentoring programs and college/career events. In addition, OCUW will be providing additional program activities with an approximate value of \$50,000. These supplemental program elements include the Roadtrip Nation curriculum, connections for corporate partner executives for career exploration, and mobile Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) career exhibits.

The Destination Graduation program is currently available in 11 high schools and 9 intermediate schools in Orange County. The district has participated in this program since 2014. The Garden Grove Unified School District requests permission to accept grant funding and services for the Orange County United Way Destination Graduation program for the 2016-17 school year.

The Orange County United Way K-3 Read & Succeed Grant supports programs that demonstrate progress toward increasing the number of students reading at grade level in kindergarten through third grade. Programs support high-priority populations at targeted elementary schools, where 60 percent or more students are receiving free or reduced lunch. Participating schools would implement district-recommended intervention programs during the school day or afterschool, in a small group setting. The grant would provide the district with \$100,000 for the 2016-17 school year. Funding would be used to purchase materials and curriculum, train teachers, and provide hourly compensation for teachers working in after-school programs

The district will provide OCUW with non-identifiable student data from the Dynamic Indicators of Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) three times annually. The district has participated in the K-3 Read & Succeed program since 2013.

It is recommended that the Board grant permission to accept funding for the Orange County United Way K-3 Read & Succeed Grant in the amount of \$100,000 for the 2016-17 school year.

#### 6. BUSINESS

Agenda Item 6 – C: Agreement for Sale and Disposal of Obsolete and/or Surplus Equipment Services

Education Codes 17545 and 17546 permit the sale and disposal of obsolete/surplus equipment and property, and allows the use of a private auction firm. The Board grants permission annually to conduct sales and disposal of district obsolete/surplus equipment and property. The district has chosen to contract with General Auction Company (GAC) in Buena Park, California for fiscal year 2016-17.

General Auction Company provides a service to assist districts in the disposal of obsolete/surplus equipment and property by facilitating these sales in a real-time auction environment or the internet. The GAC retains a portion of the final sale price as their commission or fee for service, 10 percent of gross sales for vehicles sold and 20 percent of gross sales for miscellaneous equipment and non-titled vehicles sold.

The use of GAC's services is expected to result in efficient sales of surplus property and reduce the inventory and storage requirements of obsolete/surplus items waiting for disposal. The assistant director of business services requires the authority to delegate transfer and release of these items.

It is recommended that the Board approve the agreement with General Auction Company, and delegate authority to the assistant director of business services to transfer and release district obsolete/surplus equipment and property for sale and disposal.

Agenda Item 6 – D: Agreement for Sale and Disposal of Obsolete and/or Surplus Equipment Services – E-Waste

Education Codes 17545 and 17546 permit the sale and disposal of obsolete/surplus equipment and property. The Board grants permission annually to conduct sales and disposal of obsolete/surplus equipment and property. The district has chosen to contract with Tycoon Materials, Inc. DBA Happy Recyclers (CEWID #109877) in Santa Fe Springs, California for fiscal year 2016-17 for the disposal of e-waste materials.

Tycoon Materials, Inc. DBA Happy Recyclers provides a service to assist districts in the disposal of e-waste materials by dismantling materials to the basic refineable mill commodities. Happy Recyclers follows all rules and regulations set by R2 (Responsible Recycler), ISO 14001 (Environmental Management System), State of California (Cal Recycles), DTSC, and EPA. Their facilities are fully EPA permitted and in compliance with federal, state, local, EPA, and OSHA regulations. Happy Recyclers offers a pre-determined pricing sheet for all e-waste devices ranging from \$0.01 to \$0.20 per pound, depending on the nature of the items.

The use of Tycoon Materials, Inc. DBA Happy Recyclers services is expected to result in efficient disposal of e-waste and reduce the inventory and storage requirements of e-waste waiting for disposal. The assistant director of business services requires and requests the authority to delegate transfer and release of these items.

It is recommended that the Board approve the agreement with Tycoon Materials, Inc. DBA Happy Recyclers, and delegate authority to the assistant director of business services to transfer and release district obsolete/surplus equipment and property for sale and disposal.

The State of California authorized school districts to purchase product and services from KYA Services LLC (CMAS Contract No. 4-14-72-0057A) on the California Multiple Award Schedules in accordance with the same specifications, terms, and conditions. The State of California CMAS contract with KYA Services LLC is valid through December 31, 2017.

It is recommended that the Board authorize the use of the State of California Multiple Award Schedule with KYA Services LLC (CMAS Contract No. 4-14-72-0057A) for the purchase, warranty, and installation of floor covering and related products.
