Agenda Item 4 - B: Inter-District Attendance Agreements for Physically and Severely Handicapped Students

In order to serve certain physically and severely handicapped students, the Garden Grove Unified School District participates annually, and on a contractual basis, in a county cooperative program which includes other districts and the Orange County Department of Education. Eligibilities of students served in the County Cooperative Program are Visually Handicapped, Deaf/Hard of Hearing (oral communication), Deaf (total communication), Orthopedically Handicapped and Severely Handicapped. Effective dates of this agreement are from July 1, 2017, to June 30, 2018. Cost to district could be a consideration based upon the services provided to the student (i.e. aide support, transportation, etc.).

It is recommended that the Board grant continued participation in the County Cooperative Program for the education of certain categories of physically and severely handicapped students, on a contractual basis, for the 2017-18 school year.

Agenda Item 4 - C: Department of Rehabilitation Cooperative Agreement No. 30431

Garden Grove Unified School District has successfully worked with the Department of Rehabilitation since March 2015 supporting and assisting special education students/graduates who have a variety of disabilities obtain successful employment. The district seeks to renew the three-year Cooperative Agreement (Transition Partnership Program), for the period of July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2020, with the Department of Rehabilitation to provide these services.

Individuals to be served are high school students, transitioning young adults, and adult students/graduates who have a variety of disabilities. Services will be provided to students at the following seven comprehensive high schools: Bolsa Grande, Garden Grove, La Quinta, Los Amigos, Pacifica, Rancho Alamitos, and Santiago. Once students are determined eligible, district staff will provide services during their final two years of high school. District staff will work closely with Department of Rehabilitation counselors to ensure that a coordinated service provision is implemented and will lead to a successful employment outcome. The Department of Rehabilitation will reimburse the district for all program costs and actual expenditures, including individual consumer expenses such as clothing, bus passes, and paid student employment.

The Garden Grove Unified School District has participated in Art Masters, Inc. since 1995. Art Masters, Inc. offers instructional art programs to elementary school sites in the district. They provide full day or half-day lecture and visual media assemblies. The number of assemblies for each school site varies. The individual school's Parent Teacher Association (PTA) or Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) pay for the presentations.

Although there is no direct cost to the district general fund, district-approved organizations require approval by the Board of Education to enter into a contract. This carries with it the agreement to guarantee payment of the consultant's fees. The administration and the parents of the participating schools have designed plans to confirm prepayment, which would relieve the district of that liability.

The calculations of the actual 2016-17 and estimated 2017-18 appropriations limits have been made based on formulas provided by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Documentation used in the determination of the appropriations limit is attached to the resolution and has been available to the public in the Office of Business Services, in accordance with Education Code Section 42132.

Agenda Item 7 – C: Personnel Commission Appointment Recommendation

The Education Code specifically requires that, when a vacancy will exist on December 1, the Board of Education announce the name of the person it will recommend for appointment to the Personnel Commission. The code further provides that the Board, at a meeting to be held after thirty (30) and within forty-five (45) days of the announcement, "shall provide the public and employees and employee organizations the opportunity to express their views on the qualifications of those persons recommended for appointment".

Three people serve on the Personnel Commission. One is appointed by CSEA; another is appointed by the Board of Education; the third is appointed by the other two commissioners.

The Board intends to reappoint Ms. Bernice Flatebo to a new three-year term. Ms. Flatebo is a parent of three children who graduated from Garden Grove schools. She has been an active member of the Garden Grove community for over 20 years, most recently serving as a member of the Measure A Bond Oversight Committee.

Under provisions of the law and based on the board meetings scheduled, the meeting of October 17, 2017, is designated as the time when the public and employees can express their views on the qualifications of the proposed appointee.

It is recommended that the Board announce the name of Bernice Flatebo as the person recommended by the Board of Education for appointment to the Personnel Commission for a three-year term beginning December 1, 2017, and that a public hearing will be held to allow the public and employees the opportunity to express their views on the qualifications of this person.
