Agenda Item 6 – A: Annual Budget Report 2012-13

Education Code Section 42127(a) requires each school district to adopt a budget and file with the county superintendent of schools on or before the first day of July of each year.

The 2011-12 base revenue limit of \$6,489.35 was deficited by 20.602%. This brought the revenue limit down to \$5,152.41. The base revenue limit of \$6,489.35 is increased by \$212 to represent the 3.24% COLA for 2012-13. The latest deficit proposed by the Governor is 22.272%. An additional \$441 per ADA has been deducted from the base revenue limit as an estimate of possible cuts if the temporary taxes are not passed by the voters in November 2012. These changes combine to reduce the 2012-13 revenue limits to \$4,767.83 per student.

The proposed budget has been available for public inspection from June 11 through June 19, 2012.

The Annual Budget contains statements of revenue, expenditure, and changes in balances in the following funds:

General Fund (#01) Building Fund (#21)

Adult Education Fund (#11) Capital Facilities Fund (#25) Child Development Fund (#12) School Facilities Fund (#35)

Cafeteria Account (#13) Special Reserve Fund-Capital Projects (#40)

Deferred Maintenance Fund (#14) Self Insurance Fund (#67)

In submitting the 2012-13 Annual Budget, the Board understands its fiduciary responsibility to maintain fiscal solvency for the current and subsequent two fiscal years. With the 2012-13 Annual Budget submission, the Board is providing an update on the budget reduction plan for fiscal year 2012-13.

Due to California's sluggish economic recovery, the uncertain outcome of the Governor's November tax initiative, the potential implementation of the Weighted Student Funding Formula, and proposed implementation of trigger reductions for 2012-13, it is recognized that, if necessary, the school district will continue to implement cuts of \$20.1 million in 2012-13, \$56.2 million in 2013-14 and an additional \$87.2 million in 2014-15 to maintain fiscal solvency.

It is recommended that the Board adopt the Annual Budget Report for 2012-13 (Board Report 6/19/12-3) and authorize its filing with the Orange County Superintendent of Schools.

Agenda Item 6 – B: Resolution No. 3 – Categorical Flexibility Fund

Pursuant to Education Code (EC) Section 42605(c)(2), a public hearing at a regularly scheduled Board meeting is required as a condition of receipt of funds for the proposed use of Tier III categorical programs flexibility funds. The public hearing was held May 15, 2012, where the Board took testimony from the public to discuss the proposed use of funding and approve or disapprove the proposed use of funding for each of the Tier III categorical programs. In addition, any program proposed to be closed was identified in the notice of the agenda of the public hearing. The district's business office has provided the 2012-13 Categorical Program Budget Flexibility report outlining the amounts and use of funds. The flexibility to use funds from these programs is authorized for fiscal years 2008-09 through 2012-13 by EC 42605, and extended by Senate Bill 70 (Chapter 7/2011) to 2014-15. Education Code 42605 provides school districts the flexibility to use funds from Tier III programs for other educational purposes as deemed necessary.

Agenda Item 6 – C: Resolution No. 4 – Development Fees

Effective January 2012, the State Allocation Board (SAB) approved the increase of developer fee rates to \$3.20 per square foot for residential development, and \$0.51 for commercial/industrial development. The SAB is allowed to increase fees biennially per Government Code Section 65995. Education Code Section 17620 allows the district to establish new maximum amounts by adopting a board resolution and holding a public hearing. A Notice of Public Hearing was posted 45 days prior to the meeting. The Development Fee Justification Report has been available for public inspection and comment from May 11, 2012, through June 19, 2012. If approved, the revised fees will become effective August 19, 2012.

Procedural requirements for the raising of fees are outlined in the Garden Grove Unified School District Development Fee Justification Report.

Agenda Item 6 – D: Resolution No. 5 – Lease/Lease-Back – Eight Sites

Education Code (EC) Section 17406 authorizes the governing board of a school district, without advertising for bids, to lease district owned property to any person, firm, or corporation for a minimum of \$1 per year as long as the instrument by which such property is let requires the other party to construct (or provide for the construction of) a building, buildings or improvements upon the subject property, and the title to the subject property (including building or improvements) vests in the school district at the expiration of the lease. The district leases the property (or sections of the property) to a contractor/developer, who builds or improves the property and receives lease payments from the district until the school improvements are paid off (Lease/Lease-Back process or LLB).

A resolution is required by the governing board to authorize a series of interrelated agreements which will allow the execution and delivery of site leases, subleases, and construction services agreements and other acts related to the construction/improvements at Brookhurst, Eisenhower, Excelsior, Heritage, Northcutt, Simmons, Wakeham, and Woodbury elementary schools. The construction will include improvements to the utilities infrastructure which will take place during summer 2012.

Plans and specifications have been approved by the California Division of State Architects for each project. The district requested proposals and qualifications from interested builders and contractors for the improvements.

Agenda Item 6 – E: Memorandum of Understanding – Illuminate Education

The district participated in a software development partnership several years ago with Achieve Data Solutions, LLC, for a student information system which also allowed the district use and access to the web-based student assessment tracking software application system (Data Director) and the K-6 Electronic Report Card. Achieve Data Solutions was subsequently acquired, but the district retained rights to continue use of the services and systems. The services and support have diminished, and the district requests to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with Illuminate Education, whose owners are the original developers of Data Director and K-6 Electronic Report Card.

Illuminate Education will provide unlimited district wide software licensing for Illuminate Student Information and Illuminate Data & Assessment at no charge, including all system documentation for a maximum term of eighteen years. The district agrees to an annual maintenance fee of \$40,000 which will include all major/minor upgrades, technical support and bug fixes. Payment will begin after the successful loading of district data and when schools are successfully using the systems. Custom development may be invoiced at Illuminate Education's customary rates.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Memorandum of Understanding with Illuminate Education, and authorize the Superintendent or her designee to further negotiate any rates for custom development of products and services should they become necessary.

Agenda Item 6 – F: Class-Size Penalty (Grades 4-8) – Waiver Request

Education Code (EC) sections 33050-33053 allows the State Board of Education general waiver authority. The purpose of a waiver is to provide flexibility in a school district without undermining the basic intent of the law. Due to the state's fiscal crisis and the subsequent impact to the district's financial status, the class sizes may exceed the maximum class sizes allowed under EC 41376 concerning grades 4-8. The penalty is severe as it results in an apportionment penalty which eliminates revenue limit funding for excess enrollment allowed in affected grade levels. EC 41376 requires that school districts not exceed a class size average of 29.9 or the district's 1964 class size average (30:1), whichever is greater. The district is requesting to renew its general waiver of EC41376 to waive the class-size penalty for grades 4 through 8 to no more than the 33:1 district average for grades 4 through 8, for a period of two years, 2012-13 and 2013-14. A general waiver request requires a public hearing on the waiver proposal, and notices that were appropriately posted three days prior to the hearing.

It is recommended that the Board approve submission of the General Waiver Request to waive the class-size penalty for grades 4 through 8 for a period of two years, 2012-13 and 2013-14.

Agenda Item 6 – G: Annual Insurance Report – Property, Casualty, and Excess Insurance

The annual insurance report represents estimated rates for 2012-13. Rates are obtained from the district's joint powers authorities and insurance advisors. The joint powers authorities are: (1) Southern California Regional Liability Excess Fund (ReLiEF), (2) Schools Association for Excess Risk (SAFER), and (3) Schools Alliance for Workers Compensation Excess-II (SAWCX-II). The Board authorized participation in ReLiEF in 1986 with the purpose of securing the most economical property and liability coverage, and approved membership in SAWCX in 2007 for excess workers' compensation liability coverage.

The estimated contribution rates for 2012-13 reflect adjustments in average daily attendance, property and equipment values, loss experience modification factors for both property and liability during previous years, and historical loss experience from the worker's compensation program. Based on level of coverage and overall cost, continued participation in joint powers authorities is recommended for excess liability coverages.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Annual Insurance Report and the attached recommendation for property, casualty, and excess insurance for 2012-13.

The Garden Grove Unified School District participates in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs and the After-School Snack Program. The Lunch Program is available at all schools, the Breakfast Program at 54 schools, and the After-School Snack Program at 52 schools.

School meal prices for students will be maintained through the 2012-13 school year for the fourth consecutive year. The program offers self-serve fruit/vegetable food bars at all elementary schools. Three lunch price categories are offered at the intermediate and high schools with a variety of choices and ala carte menu selections each day.
