Under the provisions of Education Code Section 39806, reimbursement for transportation may be made to parents/guardians or designated individuals, who transport handicapped children to services or classes in public or private facilities, in lieu of district or chartered transportation, if such costs are less than would be incurred by district service.

Reimbursement to the parent/guardian or designated individual shall be at either the Internal Revenue Service rate per mile or a pre-determined amount, with payment to be in the form of a district check, payable on a monthly basis.

The round-trip distance or pre-determined amount shall be agreed upon by the parent/guardian and the Office of Special Education, and a monthly statement of mileage driven shall be submitted on either the appropriate district mileage form or invoice. The parent shall sign a contract stating that a policy of insurance meeting district standards shall be carried during the term of the contract.

Agenda Item 6 – A: Annual Budget Report 2013-14

Education Code Section 42127(a) requires each school district to adopt a budget and file it with the county superintendent of schools on or before the first day of July of each year.

The 2012-13 base revenue limit of \$6,701.35 was deficited by 22.272 percent. This brought the revenue limit down to \$5,208.83.

The base revenue limit of \$6,701.35 is increased by \$106 to represent the 1.565 percent COLA for 2013-14. The latest deficit calculated by School Services of California (SSC) is 18.997 percent. The combination reduces the 2013-14 revenue limit to \$5,514.16 per student.

The proposed budget has been available for public inspection from June 10 - June 18, 2013.

The Annual Budget contains statements of revenue, expenditure, and changes in balances in the following funds:

Agenda Item 6 – B: Resolution No. 3 – Categorical Flexibility Funds

Pursuant to Education Code (EC) Section 42605(c)(2), a public hearing at a regularly scheduled Board meeting is required as a condition of receipt of funds for the proposed use of Tier III categorical programs flexibility funds. The public hearing was held May 21, 2013, where the Board took testimony from the public to discuss the proposed use of funding and approve or disapprove the proposed use of funding for each of the Tier III categorical programs. In addition, any program proposed to be closed was identified in the notice of the agenda of the public hearing. The district's business office has provided the 2013-14 Categorical Program Budget Flexibility report outlining the amounts and use of funds. The flexibility to use funds from these programs is authorized for fiscal years 2008-09 through 2012-13 by EC 42605, and extended by Senate Bill 70 (Chapter 7/2011) through 2014-15. Education Code 42605 provides school districts the flexibility to use funds from Tier III programs for other educational purposes as deemed necessary.

Agenda Item 6 – C: Resolution No. 4 – 2013-14 Education Protection Account

On November 6, 2012, the voters approved Proposition 30. Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 7, 2012, which creates in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account (EPA) to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36(f). Before June 30 of each year, the state Director of Finance shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues that will be derived from the incremental increases that will be available for transfer into the EPA during the next fiscal year. The moneys shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor, any agency of state government, salaries or benefits for administrators, or any other administrative cost. The allocation to the EPA funds reduces the district's State Aid amount, and does not result in any new funding to the district. The district's estimated amount of 2013-14 EPA funds is \$41,736,892, and is intended to be spent on instruction function expenditures.

A resolution is required by the governing board to authorize that the monies received from the EPA shall be spent as required by the California Constitution, and the spending determinations shall be made in open session of a public meeting of the governing board. The district must also annually post an accounting of the amount received and spent from the EPA on its website.

It is recommended that the Board adopt Resolution No. 4 which authorizes that monies received from the Education Protection Account be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution, and that the spending determinations have been made in open session of a public meeting of the governing board.

Agenda Item 6 –D: Resolution No. 5 – Interfund Transfers of Special or Restricted Fund Moneys

The state's current fiscal crisis and continuing cash deferrals approved by the governor and the legislature have created a cash flow problem in which the district may need to borrow cash from other sources to cover normal operational expenses. Internal or external options for cash management are available such as temporary (internal) interfund borrowing, external options such as Tax Revenue Anticipation Notes (TRANS), or borrowing from the Orange County Treasurer. The district is electing to prepare for borrowing between district funds, should it become necessary, in fiscal years 2013-14, 2014-15, and 2015-16 to meet cash flow needs in General Fund 01. Education Code Section 42603 allows the district to borrow between funds, temporarily, to address cash flow shortages.

It is recommended that the Board adopt Resolution No. 5 which authorizes for fiscal years 2013-14, 2014-15, and 2015-16 to temporarily transfer funds between the Fund 01, 11, 12, 13, 14, 21, 25, 35, 40, or 67 provided that all transfers are approved by the superintendent or her designee.

Agenda Item 6 – E: Annual Insurance Report – Property, Casualty, and Excess Insurance

The annual insurance report represents estimated rates for 2013-14. Rates are obtained from the district's joint powers authorities and insurance advisors. The joint powers authorities are (1) Southern California Regional Liability Excess Fund (ReLiEF); (2) Schools Association for Excess Risk (SAFER); and (3) Schools Alliance for Workers Compensation Excess-II (SAWCX-II). The Board authorized participation in ReLiEF in 1986 with the purpose of securing the most economical property and liability coverage, and approved membership in SAWCX in 2007 for excess workers' compensation liability coverage.

The estimated contribution rates for 2013-14 reflect adjustments in average daily attendance, property and equipment values, loss experience modification factors for both property and liability during previous years, and historical loss experience from the workers' compensation program. Based on level of coverage and overall cost, continued participation in joint powers authorities is recommended for excess liability coverages.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Annual Insurance Report and the recommendation for property, casualty and excess insurance for 2013-14.

Agenda Item 6 – F: Authorization to Use an Independent Financial Advisor for Measure A Bond Issuance

An independent financial advisor serves as the district's representative in financial planning and issuance of bonds. The passage of the Dodd-Frank Act formalized the fiduciary responsibility that financial advisors have to school districts. The primary responsibilities of a financial advisor include negotiating the lowest interest rates and underwriter cost, preparing financial plans and pricing summaries, monitoring the financial markets, and interacting with other public agencies. The costs of a financial advisor will be paid from bond proceeds and not from the general fund. It is anticipated that having an independent financial advisor will provide interest rate savings and a reduced underwriter's discount which will more than offset the fees.

District staff has evaluated several firms. The firm recommended for selection, Fieldman, Rolapp & Associates, has a significant amount of experience with large, California school districts and is based in Orange County. Fieldman, Rolapp & Associates has a long history of serving public agencies, working well with other finance and underwriting firms, and received positive feedback from peer school districts regarding service level, ethics, and client commitment.

It is recommended that the Board approve the use of Fieldman, Rolapp & Associates as the financial advisor for the remaining Measure A bond issuance at a fixed fee of \$60,000.

The State of California authorized school districts to purchase products and services from Kyocera Document Solutions America, Inc. (CMAS Contract No. 3-02-36-0044A) on the California Multiple Award Schedules in accordance with the same specifications, terms, and conditions. The State of California CMAS contract with Kyocera Document Solutions America, Inc. is valid from May 15, 2013, through December 31, 2016.
