Agenda Item 5 – A: Resolution No. 15 – 2014-15 State Preschool Program Application for Continued Funding

State preschool classes are available for children living within district boundaries who have an eligible birth date and whose family gross income does not exceed the income ceilings established by the California Department of Education. The curriculum and strategies utilized in the preschool classroom are aligned with the California Preschool Learning Foundations. Parent involvement and education is a key component of the preschool program, including classes that teach parents how to develop early literacy at home. The district is eligible for approximately \$3,300,786 to support preschool programs in 25 classrooms at the following 11 schools: Brookhurst, Bryant, Clinton Corner, Eisenhower, Heritage, Murdy, Peters K-3, Rosita, Russell, Violette, and Wakeham.

It is recommended that the Board adopt Resolution No. 15, authorizing submission of the 2014-15 application and acceptance of funding for the State Preschool Program at 11 district schools.

Agenda Item 5 – B: 21st Century Community Learning Centers – Elementary and 21st Century High School After School Safety and Enrichment for Teens Program Grants

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers - Elementary and 21st Century High School After School Safety and Enrichment for Teens (ASSETs) Program grants were authorized under Title I, Part I of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act and amended by the passage of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. The purpose of these programs is to establish or expand community-learning centers that provide safe and educationally enriching alternatives for children and youth during non-school hours. The 21st Century Programs are developed through partnerships between schools and community-based organizations such as the Boys & Girls Clubs of Garden Grove.

The Garden Grove Unified School District and the Boys & Girls Clubs of Garden Grove have the opportunity to jointly apply for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers - Elementary and 21st Century High School ASSETs grants. The proposal is to add new high school ASSETs programs at Bolsa Grande, Los Amigos, and Rancho Alamitos high schools and expand current After School Education and Safety programs at Anthony, Bryant, Excelsior, Faylane, Hazard, Heritage, Paine, Post, and Russell elementary schools. The grant is competitive and if received would provide up to \$1,440,250 in additional funding each year for a five-year period.

It is recommended that the Board grant permission for the Garden Grove Unified School District and the Boys & Girls Clubs of Garden Grove to jointly apply for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers - Elementary, and 21st Century High School After School Safety and Enrichment for Teens Program grants.

Agenda Item 5 – C: Understanding American Citizenship Program

The Orange County Department of Education and University of California, Irvine History Project have been awarded an U.S. Department of Education Teaching American History grant to serve ACCESS and Orange County continuation school history teachers. The Understanding American Citizenship (UAC) program grant for 2013-14 was awarded to Hare Continuation High School. Through professional development, this program will improve teachers' mastery of the content of traditional American history; provide academically-guided support for standards-aligned curriculum reform; support capacity-building and development of teacher networks for long-term sustainability of the project in Orange County; and increase students' historical content knowledge and thinking.

The history department at Hare Continuation High School in the Garden Grove Unified School District applied for and was awarded the grant for the UAC program. This grant will fund professional development sessions focused on U.S. History through the lens of citizenship designed by the history department at University of California, Irvine. The \$8,000 grant will cover the UAC Project Professional Development Institute and seminar, lesson study, and field study dates.

Agenda Item 5 – D: Latinos Unidos - Invited Partnership with Orange County United Way

As part of an invited partnership, the Orange County United Way (OCUW) has presented the Garden Grove Unified School District with \$25,000 to support the Latinos Unidos (LU) project. Active LU clubs have been formed at all district high schools, including Hare. Through the actions of our LU students and their teacher mentors, Latinos Unidos has become a district-wide organization whose purpose is to provide support systems to Latino students in order to achieve academic success. The LU student leaders have identified seven goals for the program:

- 1. Provide motivation and support to Latino students.
- 2. Promote Latinos in higher education and prepare Latinos for future college goals.
- 3. Support students to get involved in the community through community service.
- 4. Improve Latino participation in the community, including cultural awareness.
- 5. Provide help and support in academics through tutoring and college information support.
- 6. Provide opportunities for peer mentoring and college/career exploration.
- 7. Help Latinos build confidence, leadership, self-motivation, and healthy lifestyles.

Their goals will be accomplished through the following five key activities: 1) tutoring and academic support; 2) mentorship; 3) community service; 4) college preparation; and 5) social/cultural events. Funding will support all club activities and programs, including costs related to materials and supplies, printing, transportation, conference fees, and teacher hourly.

It is recommended that the Board grant permission to accept the invited partnership funds, totaling \$25,000, to support the district-wide Latinos Unidos program.

Agenda Item 5 – E: Girls Incorporated of Orange County

Girls Incorporated of Orange County has the opportunity to deliver programming at Alamitos and Doig intermediate schools for identified female students. Selected students at Alamitos and Doig will receive the "Mind+Body" program, designed to encompass the whole girl - mentally and physically. The students will have the opportunity to engage in meaningful activities and topics such as: stress management, body image, nutrition, and fitness. Following the traditional model of outreach, Girls Incorporated would provide programming for one hour and 15 minutes after school for one day a week on Mondays or Thursdays respectively for ten weeks. Participant numbers may run from 8 to 30 students. Programming is at no cost to the school district.

It is recommended that the Board approve the agreement allowing Girls Incorporated of Orange County to provide the "Mind+Body" program to selected female students at Alamitos and Doig intermediate schools.

Agenda Item 6 – C: Food Sales by Student Organizations

Administrative Regulation 5140.4, revised April 2, 2007, incorporates these regulations.
