Agenda Item 5 – B: Garden Grove Unified School District Preschool Licenses

Preschool programs are licensed on a per-classroom basis. Last year, GGUSD provided preschool programs in 23 classrooms at 11 elementary school sites. This year, due to the low enrollment at Eisenhower Elementary, it became necessary to drop Eisenhower as a preschool site. However, Carver was added as a site, still maintaining 11 schools with preschool programs. In order to maintain 23 classrooms district wide, the state requires board action to transfer the previous Eisenhower license to a classroom at Carver. Additionally, this Board action will allow future authorization for the preschool principal to transfer and update existing classroom licenses as needed.

Agenda Item 5 – C: Assembly, Field, and Overnight Outdoor Science Camp Programs Sponsored by the Orange County Department of Education and Other District-Approved Organizations

The Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) and other district-approved organizations sponsor assembly and field programs and overnight outdoor science camp program experiences for elementary school students on varying dates throughout the school year. The assembly programs offer age-appropriate assembly presentations. Participation fees will be paid by categorical funds, grants, and/or by parent groups. The field trip programs offered are one and two-day trips to local venues. Participation fees and transportation costs will be paid by categorical funds, grants, and/or parent groups. The overnight outdoor science camp programs offer three, four, or five-day camp experiences for sixth grade students. Camp fees and transportation costs will be paid by parent and/or parent group donations, sponsorships, and fund-raising.

Although there is no direct cost to the district general fund, the OCDE and other district-approved organizations require approval by the district Board of Education to enter into a contract. This carries with it the agreement to guarantee payment of the student fees. The administration and parents of the participating schools have designed plans to confirm prepayment which would relieve the district of that liability. Specific guidelines for the handling of fundraising projects and the limitations of use of school time for this project have been agreed upon by parents and staff. Funds will be available for students with financial need.

Agenda Item 6 – C: Agreement for Employee Benefits Consulting and Brokerage Services

The district provides self-insured health benefits to all eligible employees. The district has used the professional consulting services of Burnham Benefits, Irvine, CA for the past year. The implementation of the Affordable Care Act has triggered a greater need for a broad range of in-depth consulting services. These additional services will allow for proper legal application of the laws and actuarial review of our entire benefits platform. Burnham Benefits brings many years of experience in assisting districts with innovative benefits solutions to control costs which will be critical in the challenging times ahead. Therefore, the district's recommendation is to renew the contract with Burnham Benefits for consulting services, including legal and actuarial advisement, benefit plan design, funding analysis and compliance review for one additional year, with no rate increase at \$14,583 per month effective September 1, 2015, through August 31, 2016.

Effective October 12, 1994, the State of California approved the use of California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) by local governments (i.e. city, county, district, or other local governmental body empowered to expend public funds) for information technology products and services. Using a CMAS contract would be a cost-effective manner of procurement for information technology products and services for the data network.

Public Contract Code Sections 10298, 10299, and 12100 provide that the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, may authorize any public agency to purchase equipment and services for its use in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law to make such purchases. The State of California has authorized school districts to purchase network based video surveillance and security products from NIC Partners on the California Multiple Award Schedules in accordance with the same specifications, terms, and conditions. The State of California CMAS Contract No. 3-14-70-2473V with NIC Partners is valid from February 14, 2014 through March 31, 2019.

Public Contract Code Section 20118 provides that the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, may authorize any public agency to rent and/or purchase personal property for its use in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law to make such rental and/or purchases.

The Kern High School District has extended its contract with Mobile Modular Bid No. 2423 for the rental and/or purchase of relocatable modular classrooms. The terms and conditions of the bid are effective March 15, 2015, through March 16, 2016.

The agreement between Mobile Modular and the Kern High School District includes competitive pricing that provides the district with a purchasing vehicle for student interim housing during the facilities modernization program. The monthly rental amount is \$285. Installation, delivery/return freight, and knockdown price is a cumulative one-time amount of \$7,804 per 24' x 40' relocatable classroom.

Public Contract Code Section 20118 provides that the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, if the board has determined it to be in the best interests of the district, may authorize by contract or purchase order, any public district to purchase materials, supplies, or equipment for the district in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law to make the purchases from a vendor.

The Val Verde Unified School District has awarded Bid No. FS 15/16-02 for the purchase of milk, dairy, fruit juice and ice cream products from Hollandia Dairy. The contract is in effect from July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016 with two optional one-year extensions. Agenda Item 6 – G: California Fresh Fruits and Vegetable Program Grant

In May 2008, the National School Lunch Act was amended to add the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) which allows competitive grant opportunities for public elementary schools to participate. The purpose of the grant is to provide all children in eligible schools with a variety of free fresh fruit and vegetable snacks throughout the day as a supplement, and to teach students about good nutrition. The district's Food Services Department submitted an application for potentially eligible schools, and the California Department of Education Nutrition Services Department selected schools based on the percentages of low-income students eligible for free or reduced-price meals and their ability to properly implement and operate the FFVP. The grant allocation is approximately \$53 per student through a reimbursement claim process. The district was notified that seven elementary schools are eligible in 2015-16: Clinton-Mendenhall, Eisenhower, Hazard, Heritage, Russell, Simmons, and Woodbury elementary schools. The total grant award for seven schools is \$231,663. Fruits and vegetables will be served during the morning recess a minimum of two to three times weekly, and will be administered by the district's Food Services Department.

Public Contracts Code Section 10298, 10299, 12100 provides that the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, may authorize any public agency to purchase equipment and services for its use in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law to make such purchases. The State of California has authorized school districts to purchase information technology products and services from NIC Partners on the California Multiple Award Schedules in accordance with the same specifications, terms, and conditions. The State of California CMAS Contract No. 3-10-70-2473N with NIC Partners has been extended and is valid through December 31, 2018.
